We had our second Fly Tying Day of the off season at Fish and Game on August 7th. Once again not a great turnout but enough members (five) to make it worth while. A number of flies were tied, some for personal use and some to give to participants in next years Fly Fishing Course.



August Club Day by Dave

After a week of poor long range weather forecasts, the weather came right for our August Club Trip. I had already arranged to pick up Murray and Dayne on the way out of town before heading to Fish & Game to see who else was coming. Only found Tony there. As I already had a full car, Tony headed off to Te Waewae on his own while I picked the others up and headed west.

When we arrived good weather and a northerly breeze. That meant that the wind was off shore along the edge of the lagoon. The lagoon was a bit cloudy.

Tony was ready to go and headed off along the edge of the lagoon to the east while the rest of us got ready. Once set to go Murray and Dayne headed off around the top of the closest inlet to the west while I started right at the car but also heading west.

Once I had reached the first inlet I fished the east side of it before heading around the top to fish the west side on the inlet. The going was really tough with a lot of the area very wet with a lot of surface water. There was quite a bit of weed so I had to clear the fly often. At the lagoon end of the inlet, I finally hooked up on a small brown, having had one light take before that. By this time I could see that Dayne was back near the car and decided to head back to the car for lunch. I found Murray also heading back and we arrived just as Tony was leaving. He hadn't caught anything but had had a big swirl at his fly on one occasion as he lifted it from the water. Murray and Dayne hadn't had any action.

As we were eating lunch the breeze started to die down. Once lunch was out of the way we all decided to fish along the edge to the east, none of us being keen to head back into the very wet area to the west. Murray had a hit on his fly but failed to hook up.

Relatively early we decided it was time to head home. While we were packing up the noise from the surf became a lot louder and this was due to the wind changing to the opposite direction. This would have made casting a lot more difficult so our timing was good.

It was good to get out as this was my first outing since the end of May.

Women's Fly-Fishing Tournament May 2022 by Julie

This tournament is based at Turangi. An awesome little town with a focus very much on fly-fishing. The Sporting Life Turangi and Creel Tackle House & Cafe were tremendous shops. Staff at both went out of their way to assist me with purchases, things I needed and things I didn't really need. I do think the economy of Turangi must have taken a tumble when I came home.

I discovered there are 50 pools on the Tongariro, most of them no more than 10 minutes from the Tongariro River motel where we were staying. I didn't get to all of them but made a good attempt.

I found the story of how this tournament came into being told by Ross, the Motel owner to be interesting. He said after a Taupō lodge advertised a fishing tournament 4 years ago, one of the male entrants' wives also applied to participate but she was told it was for men only. So Ross and other local club members ran a separate tournament for the ladies. It was so successful that the event now occurs annually.

This year the registration numbers were closed at around 35 entrants. I was one of two participants from the South Island, Serena McDonald from Timaru was the other. Had a lovely early 5am dash to the river with

Serena on the second morning of the tournament. Cold, but she knew of a very beautiful pool and it was. We had to be back at the motel to go fishing with the team at 8am. I found overall to be a very friendly group, and provided a great opportunity to find more about fishing different areas; to make new fishing buddies; reacquaint with others and to learn more about fly fishing.

One of the major highlights for me was meeting Aotearoa's first all female fly-fishing team. Rachel McNae is the Captain of the team and other members are Suzie Foggo, Sarah Delany, Heather Carrington, Louise Stuart Wendy Lu. (pictured right)

Competitions by Julie



Last month's fly was the klinkhamer. Seven flies were entered but there was no clear winner with several flies receiving one or two votes.

This month's fly is the muddler minnow (see July Ripples) and the September fly is the highland dun variant as below. This is the final fly for this year's competition.

Highland Dun Variant by Gerda

Materials:

Hook Black Magic E12 Wing Duck feather

Body Dark brown dubbing fur

Rib Fine gold tinsel

Tail Dark brown cock hackle fibres

Hackle Dark brown cock hackle


Thread Brown dark

- 1. Run thread from front to back tie in the tail and gold tinsel
- 2. Select two slips of opposing wings place together silver side in and points facing the eye, so that their tips are level and feathers curve away from each other.



Place approx quarter of hook size back from the eye. Then catch duck feathers with a winging loop, tie in making sure its upright. Leaving thread at the back.

- 3. Wind close turns of thread over waste ends of the hackle fibres and tinsel to provide an even base for the body. Dub on a pinch of dark brown fur and wind it on to form a slim body.
- 4. Wind on four turns of gold tinsel along body and secure.
- 5. Prepare a dark brown cock hackle with fibres twice the length of the hook gape. Catch it in the wing base, and make three turns behind and two in the front of the wing. Secure and tie off using cement as needed.
